St Julian's offers students three curricula: the National Curriculum of England and Wales, or the Portuguese National Curriculum, and subsequently the International Baccalaureate Diploma.

Up to the end of Year 11 in the English Section our programme shall be based on the National Curriculum requirements of England and Wales, taking due note of the location of the school in Portugal, and the international nature of its student population. The school will aim to ensure that it meets in spirit and detail the demands of that Curriculum, and will assess students' work accordingly. Such assessment through classwork, homework, formative and summative examinations and other relevant methods will have learning at the center of the evaluation exercise. Assessment results will be recorded in an effective manner and communicated to students and parents, both in written and oral form, at regular intervals, and in a manner readily understood by all.


There will be a parallel course of instruction which follows the Portuguese National Curriculum from 1º ano to 9º ano and an associated bridging programme of instruction (pre-IB) if students choose to continue studying the International Baccalaureate Diploma programme at St. Julian's. Every effort is made to integrate both educational and other opportunities across the English and Portuguese sections.

Students in Years 12 and 13 prepare for University entrance and lifelong learning by following the International Baccalaureate Diploma programme.
